Headteacher's Welcome

The Department for Education recently published the Schools Bill in response to the White Paper 'Opportunities for all'. In one of their policy intentions, it states that 'By 2030, all children will benefit from being taught in a family of schools, with their school in a strong multi academy trust or with plans to join or form one'. By January 2022, 83% of Staffordshire secondary schools were academies.

As you know, over the years our school has regularly reviewed school status which resulted in Blythe Bridge High School & Sixth Form converting to a foundation trust school in 2012, and in 2018 becoming associate members of John Taylor Multi Academy Trust. Through this partnership, we have benefited from a range of opportunities including CPD and links to the National Forest Teaching School. We are



now in a position to be able to formalise this ongoing relationship by becoming full members of the trust. In the autumn term we will contact all stakeholders as we enter a formal period of consultation to answer questions and embrace the views of all. By working together, it is clear that the Trust have values and ethos aligned to ours and we are excited about the positive impact it will have moving forward.

We made it to the end of the summer term, and at the end of this academic year there feels even more to celebrate than ever before. We have had an uninterrupted year in terms of no lockdowns but students, parents/carers, staff and governors have still faced many challenges and I am beyond proud of what we have achieved together. Congratulations to all our students who sat formal examinations this year, they respected the process and did their very best, we could not ask for anything more. I, and the whole team, have been humbled by all of the kind and thoughtful messages of support, more recently during our Ofsted inspection, but also the small impromptu messages that just drop into the inbox to say thank you are so motivational and much appreciated.

This week we have said fond farewells to the staff who are leaving us. Mr Aston has achieved qualified teacher status this year and moves on to a full-time teaching position at a local school and Mrs Newman, who has just completed her second year in the science department, has secured a role with pastoral responsibilities at a school in Stoke on Trent. I was doing my GCSEs as a sixteen-year-old in rural Derbyshire. I had never met Stephen but his death stuck with me and has continued to do to this day. I struggled with the idea of someone dying on the street, stabbed simply because of the colour of their skin, a future taken away because of someone else's views. I was the same age as some of the killers and that blew me away.

Whilst most people my age know of this case, it was clear that the students of today don't. And yet they are the ones who now study citizenship at school, they are the ones who are taught in institutions that have to have an anti-racism policy, they are of the age where knife crime is more prevalent than ever and yet it feels like the lessons that were learned about Stephen's killing haven't been really learned.

We need to not forget what happened to Stephen all those years ago.

We need the 16-year-olds of today to know that knives and racism wreck lives.

History

History Curriculum

As the year comes to a close our students have been continuing to excel across the history curriculum, and have been studying some fascinating content.

Year 7 have been concluding their studies on Tudor and Stuart England with a short depth study on the English Civil War. Year 8 have been learning about the growth of democracy in the United Kingdom looking at the Chartist movement, Liberal Welfare Reforms and Suffrage movement. Year 9 have begun studying their GCSE content by exploring the 'Historic Environment' medicine study. Students have been looking at medical treatments in the British Sector of the Western Front in the First World War. The students have engaged with source material and studying areas from blood transfusions, to plastic surgery and the infamous forehead flap! Year 10 are now well into their depth study on Elizabeth I, focussing on the challenges a female monarch would have faced during her reign. Specifically Mary Queen of Scots and religious upheaval.

Finally, our Sixth Form have ended the year with the opportunity to go to Keele University for taster sessions in their undergraduate programme. Year 12, and future Year 12 students, have enjoyed a trip to the UK Houses of Parliament and Supreme Court too. 

Attendance

School attendance has obviously been affected by the pandemic and absence due to Covid is unavoidable. With restrictions lessening, we want to take this opportunity to reiterate our expectations from September 2022.

The Department for Education (DfE) announced in 2015 that any student whose attendance falls below 90% will be classed as a persistently absent student. This equates to just over 3 days of absence per half term and applies if the absence is authorised or unauthorised. Therefore, if a student misses 19 or more days over an academic year, they will be classed as persistently absent.

The DfE state that if over five academic years a student has attendance of 90%, the child will miss the equivalent of half a school year which puts them at a huge disadvantage. Research suggests that 92% attendance (17 days missed from school each year) equates to a drop of 1 GCSE grade in every subject. Missing school means missing out on learning and this can have a detrimental impact on a child's attainment as well as their personal development. In certain circumstances, non-attendance can also raise safeguarding concerns and lead to poor mental health.

Parents/carers have a legal responsibility to ensure their child attends school regularly however, if a child is unavoidably absent from school then parents/carers are expected to:

Telephone the school office on the first day of absence, and on each subsequent day, to report the reason for the absence and the expected date of their child's return to school.

When requested, provide medical evidence or other appropriate documentation that supports the level of absence.

Attendance

Term Time Holidays

Taking holidays in term time can affect a child's education as much as any other absence and we would appreciate parents' help by not taking children away in school time. There is no automatic entitlement in law to taking time off in school time to go on holiday and family holidays are not considered to be "exceptional circumstances" therefore cannot be authorised.

Examples of exceptional circumstances where leave may be granted by the headteacher during term time are:

If a parent is service personnel and is returning from a tour of duty abroad.

Where an absence from school is recommended by a health professional as part of a parent or child's rehabilitation from a medical or emotional issue.

The death or terminal illness of a close relative.

Religious observance.

To attend a wedding or funeral of a close relative if the circumstances are truly exceptional.

As I am sure you are aware, as a parent/carer you have legal responsibility for ensuring that your child attends school regularly. In some circumstances, you could be referred to the Local Authority for a Penalty Notice to be issued under Section 444(1) of the Education Act 1996 for failing to ensure the regular attendance of your child. This is in line with Staffordshire County Council's Code of Conduct.

Punctuality

All students are expected to be in school at 8.45am in good time for Period 1. Any student who arrives after this time is marked late in the register. Two lates per week result in a 30-minute detention after school. It is essential you ensure that your child arrives on time to prevent disruption to your child's own learning and that of others. 5 minutes late per day equates to approximately 17 hours of learning lost over a year. Late after the registers have closed (9am) is classified as an unauthorised absence. Unauthorised absences due to poor punctuality can result in a referral to the Local Authority and could result in a Penalty Notice.

We understand that there may be rare occasions when your child is unavoidably late. On these occasions, please make sure that you contact the school to inform us of this.

We would like to work with you to ensure that your child attends school every day and is on time. If you feel there are issues which are preventing them from doing so, please contact us directly so we can address them together.



Return of Fieldwork

Our Year 10 geographers have undertaken two fieldwork investigations which relates to the GCSE geography specification. Our students have had the opportunity to visit Carding Mill Valley and Stafford. These form part of physical and human investigations.

At Carding Mill Valley, our geographers gained some real-life experience both in terms of seeing river processes in action and in



terms of working as a team to collect data towards their first geographical enquiry. Staff have been extremely impressed with the enthusiasm of our geographers. One group collected more data than any other in the past ten years which is an impressive feat. In Stafford, students got the opportunity to investigate how housing changes through the town and collect their own primary data which they will analyse next year. Of course, the visits are an extremely important part of the GCSE geography course and the pupils that attended will have collected data which will hopefully allow them to achieve outstanding results in their paper 3 at the end of Year 11. Students will have taken away positive memories which will stay with them for the rest of their lives. Despite the wind and rain which affected both groups, the students were some of the most passionate and serious geographers that we have ever taken to Carding Mill Valley.

Current Year 12 students have already visited Ainsdale beach and sand dunes, Shelton, Carding Mill Valley and Castleton this year and have had similar memorable experiences.

Over the next year or so the geography department are planning on running a number of educational visits including visits to the Sefton Coast and Liverpool with Key stage 3, Iceland in October 2023 for GCSE and A-level students, North Wales with the next cohort of Year 12 and the Lake District with the next cohort of GCSE students.


Puzzle Day


