Spain Trip

Tossa de Mar Visit – July 2022

After three years without a visit due to the Covid-19 pandemic, we were thrilled to be able to take a group of students to Cataluña in Northern Spain in July 2022. The group flew from Manchester airport to Barcelona airport, before travelling to the town of Tossa de Mar on the eastern coast of Spain.

The pupils were accompanied by Mrs. Burr, Mrs. Collins, Mr. James, Miss. Smith, and Mr. Sutton. On the first day, students sunbathed and swam in the hotel pool, before playing on the beach. The next day, students visited the market in Girona where they were set a number of challenges to allow them to practise their Spanish, before touring the city's historic centre, with its famous cathedral and distinctive buildings. Many students also sampled the delicious ice cream from the famous shop Rocambolesc.

On Wednesday, we visited the PortAventura theme park which is home to Shambhala, one of the tallest roller coasters in Europe. On Thursday students visited the city of Barcelona and following a tour of the Spotify Camp Nou Stadium, home of FC Barcelona, students toured the city with expert commentary from our excellent guide, Eva.

The week finished with a disco in the hotel on the evening before returning home. During the week, as always, the behaviour of our students was excellent. 




The charity collection is led by Year 7 students although all donations are welcome from across all year groups.




UK BEBRAS

Year 12 Drama BTEC Class


