Year 10 Blencathra Visit

Our Year 10 geographers enjoyed a three-day residential to Blencathra in the Lake District. The residential's aim was to experience the awe and wonder of the Lake District environment, and everyone enjoyed the contrasting surroundings, made even more impressive by lovely clear skies, from amazing views of the undulating terrain in the day to night skies unfettered by light pollution. The purpose of the visit was to complete two investigations. The first investigating Kilnhow Beck, a local river, to see how its characteristics change downstream. The second was to examine the quality of life in Carlisle by comparing the St Aidens (inner city) to Stanwix (suburbs).

Students worked intensely both in the field and the classroom environment during the morning and evening. They also particularly enjoyed their free time playing games with others and developing independence skills by making their packed lunches and being prepared for different activities. Students did not let us down.

A large number of students expressed their thanks and enthusiasm for the opportunity to visit Blencathra.



Trip to Iceland



Year 11 and 12

In the October half term, fifty students visited Iceland, the land of fire and ice. This is the first time the Geography department has organised this visit, and it was a fantastic success.

The first day consisted of travelling to Iceland. Once we had settled into the Hotel Cabin, we went to Reykjavik city centre on foot to look around the shops and businesses. On this frosty walk, we headed down to the seafront, and to our astonishment, we looked into the sky and saw the Northern Lights. Students were amazed at their beauty.

Day 2 consisted of the South Shore Tour, where students made several stops. Firstly, we visited Solheimajokull, a retreating glacier. Students enjoyed looking at the landscape and being able to touch the glacier. As this glacier is shrinking, there is the possibility that it may disappear within their lifetime. The second stop was Vik. a small south coast town where students had lunch and time for shopping. On the return journey, we visited two waterfalls, the spectacular Skógafoss and, excitingly, Selialandsfoss, where we could walk behind the powerful waterfall.















Trip to Iceland







In the evening, we saw the lit-up church in Reykjavik, which was beautiful, and to our surprise, the Northern lights appeared above our heads again. This time, they were even more spectacular.

Day 3 was another action-packed day. Firstly, we visited a geothermal power station in southern Iceland (close to the current seismic activity). We then walked around the Kerid volcanic crater. We spent a couple of hours bathing in the natural spas of the Secret Lagoon, which reached up to 40 degrees Celsius. In the afternoon, we visited the spectacular geyser, which erupted several times (getting us soaked in the process), and then on to the National Park. Here, we could walk between the North American and Eurasian tectonic plates, surrounded by beautiful landscapes.

Students were exhausted before we returned home in the early hours of Thursday morning. However, they enjoyed a treat of takeaway pizza. I want to thank all the students who attended. They were model students. Thanks also to the fantastic staff who gave up their half term break. Thank you, Mrs Clarke, Mrs Kadri, Mrs Cotterill (a last-minute stand-in) and Mr James.






In December, all students were invited to participate in the Art department's competition to design a school Christmas card. We had some very cheerful entries from some very talented artists. Well done to everyone who took part.




Let's hope our new mini bus is as loyal and adventurous as our previous one.

Citizenship Guest Speakers

During the autumn term we have had various guest speakers and visitors into school to deliver important messages to our students. These opportunities enrich our curriculum provision and offer further insight into some very important topics.



Oddballs

On the 16th of October our vear 11 students and sixth formers received a talk on testicular cancer. The talk was delivered by an Oddballs Ambassador and our students received the talk with great maturity and sensitivity. During the talk key information was shared about how to access support if you have any concerns about testicular cancer, how to check yourself for signs and symptoms and how to support someone else who is concerned.



Loudmouth

At the start of the academic year our year 9 students were lucky enough to receive a presentation by Loudmouth. The students participated in an hour-long drama and discussion workshop covering the many forms of bullying including cvber. sexist/sexual. homophobic bullying and bullying linked to sexting. The session also covered respect in relationships and male victims of teenage relationship abuse.

The workshop was led by "Loudmouth" a highly respected and innovative educational theatre company who have been delivering workshops on personal, social and health education since 1994.

The session increased our young people's empathy for victims of bullying, increased their knowledge of different types of bullying and ensured they know where to go for help and support.



Road Safety

In November, we were visited by our local road safety education officer.

During the day students in Year 7, 10 and 12 received talks covering key road safety information relevant to their age.

Our students were excellent throughout and we hope they use the information shared to stay safe when on or around the roads.

Quiz and Chips

Well done to 'Team Africa 2025' for running a successful 'Quiz and Chips' night to raise money for the Africa volunteering visit in 2025.

In total, the group raised £380 and, on the night, displayed outstanding teamwork to ensure everyone had a good time.

What other extra curricular activities do you take part in?






Year 10 Art


Ecologically Friendly Trip

Homework Help

- Set aside time each evening to check Frog for homework and complete it. If you always do it at the same time, it becomes a habit and, therefore, it is more likely that you will do it.
- If you struggle to remember to check for homework, set an alarm on your phone to go off at the same time each weekday, say 4 pm. Set a label on the alarm: "Check Frog for homework".
- Complete your homework in a quiet place. Avoid distractions such as your mobile phone, the internet or music. Particularly if you are trying to learn key terms or concepts, music doesn't help with learning - in fact, listening to music makes you learn less, so you will have to work harder.
- Once you complete the homework, put it in your school bag or upload it to Frog straight away.
- Please don't leave the homework until the night before it is due. If you
 try to complete it sooner, you can contact your teacher. If you struggle
 to complete it the night it is due, your teacher can't help you.
- Remember there is homework club after school if you need help accessing Frog or don't have a computer at home. If you use homework club, you don't have any homework to do once you get home. You can keep school and home separate.
- Pair up with a homework 'buddy'. But make sure it is someone you will work with and not just mess about with. You can support each other, which might make it less likely you won't do it, as you would let your buddy down.
- Pair the homework with something you enjoy. Do the homework, then
 the thing you enjoy as a reward. But don't do the thing you enjoy first,
 as you may never get to the homework!
- Write each homework on a Post-it note or index card or make a checklist. Use these to prioritise what you will do first. Tear up the Postit note or index card when complete - this also can be satisfying.
- Have a day when you don't do any homework. Keep this day free. It's time to do something else.






GCSE English literature and drama trip to see Dickens' A Christmas Carol

All About History

What is Remembrance Day and how did we commemorate this as a school?

The first armistice day was exactly one year after the end of world war I and the two minutes silence was at the suggestion of King George V as period of reflection for those who had fallen during the war. After the end of WW2 armistice day was renamed remembrance Sunday and in 1956 it was decided that it would take place on the second Sunday of every November. The most recognisable symbol of remembrance is the poppy, which became associated with world war one after hundreds of them grew on the battle fields in Belgium and northern France. In 1921 the Royal British Legion began making and selling red paper poppies.

Similar celebrations take place at US veterans' day and Australia, Canada and France's own Remembrance Day which takes place around a similar time of the year. As a school we paid our respects by holding a two minutes silence at 11am for the fallen soldiers of both world wars and also any other military conflicts that have taken place where people may have lost their lives. To mark the beginning of the two minutes silence we also had students located around the school playing the last post as a mark of respect because the song is a representation of soldiers going to their final resting place.

Important to note

 - JTMAT has a graduated response to attendance and punctuality
- · Attendance letters in line with the JTMAT policy will be sent if attendance is a concern
- We are following the JTMAT policy and a leave of absence in term time could lead to a Fixed Penalty Notice

Punctuality

All students are expected to be in school at 8.45am in good time for Period 1. Any student who arrives after this time is marked late on the register. Two lates per week result in a 30-minute detention after school. It is essential that you ensure your child arrives at school on time to prevent disruption to your child's own learning and that of others. Late after the registers have closed is classified as an unauthorised absence.

Roblox

Roblox is a platform consisting of a collection of games. Players can either create games or play games that other users have created. It is free to download (however subscription options and in game/app purchases are available) and can be played across numerous devices. A lot of the content is user



generated, which may mean not all games will be suitable for your child to

view/play. It is important to set up appropriate parental controls for your child.

What rating is Roblox?

PEGI rate Roblox with a Parental Guidance label, this is because it is difficult to rate due to the huge level of user generated content. It is rated for **'Teens'** on Google Play and **12+** on the App store.

What should I be aware of?

Chat Facility - Players can chat to each other on Roblox. You can turn communication off completely or add restrictions, such as only communicate with friends.

Virtual Currency - Players can buy Robux (their virtual currency) to buy in-game upgrades or accessories. For children under 13, you can set the Monthly Spend Restriction in settings.

Game content – as mentioned, users create games so sometimes the content/themes may not be appropriate for your child.

How do I report abuse and block users?

Roblox have a Report Abuse system so show your child how to use it to report inappropriate content as well as how to block other users. There are different ways of doing this depending on the device being used.

How do I set up parental controls and a pin?

Parental controls are available within settings. We recommend that you explore the parental controls available and set as appropriate. You can enable a PIN, which means that changes cannot be made without this pin. You can set up Allowed Experiences, which allows you to select age-appropriate experiences, so your child can only join experiences that match their age. Age categories

available are for all, 9+, 13+ and 17+. All experiences are still searchable though.

To view content that is suitable for 17+, then a user must participate in a verification process by submitting valid ID.

TikTok

You must be over 13 years of age to use TikTok.

TikTok is a social media platform for sharing and watching short video clips. Some of the videos on TikTok may not be appropriate for your child to view and there is also the risk of strangers contacting your child. If your child is using TikTok then make sure the appropriate security/privacy settings are on.



Account set up

By default, accounts for people under 16 are set to private at the start and we would recommend keeping it as this. This means your child must approve follower requests. You can read more about the other settings available (such as switching off comments and switching on restricted mode) here: https://support.tiktok.com/en/account-and-privacy/account-privacy-settings.

As always, it is important that when setting up an account on TikTok, your child enters their real date of birth as accounts are tailored by age. For example, Direct Messaging is disabled for accounts aged 13-15 and they do not receive push notifications from 9pm. In addition, advertisements are tailored to the user's age.

Family Pairing

This allows you to link your own account to your child's account. You can then set controls such as restricted mode (limit the appearance of content that may not be appropriate) and screen time management. You can find out more here: https://www.tiktok.com/safety/en/guardians-guide/

Inappropriate content, themes and challenges on TikTok

Whilst against TikTok's guidelines, explicit and inappropriate content can be found on this platform, for example nudity/sexual content and hate speech. We often see viral challenges on social media, some of which can be dangerous. If your child is using TikTok, chat to them regularly about what they are viewing.

Blocking and Reporting

WhatsApp's editing feature

You must be at least 16 years old to use WhatsApp.

Sensitive Content Warning on Apple devices

Apple released their new iOS 17 operating system in September. One of the new features includes a "sensitive content warning.' You can choose to receive a warning about any photos or videos that might contain nudity before you view them. It also links to related resources and quidance.

If Sensitive Content Warning is activated on your device and the device believes an image/video contains nudity, then your device will blur the image and display a warning so you can choose to view it or not. You can activate this setting in 'Privacy and Security.' You can find out more here:
