The work of the Charity Ambassadors has inspired many other groups of students to continue our volunteering project in the Older Adults department at the Royal Stoke Hospital. Since then, we have put on a variety show. taken the cast of Mary Poppins to perform, and a group of sixth form students have led an arts and crafts workshop. A group of representatives from Years 7-10 who participated in the project were selected to attend a presentation from the team. However, we didn't want anyone to miss out on Mr Leese's fantastic insights, so a member of our podcast team transcribed the conversation for our school community to read. STUDENT LEADERSHIP

Students: Welcome to the PRK podcast, which is the new podcast that we talk about news around school and what's happening. And today's guest is Mr Leese.

Mr Leese: Afternoon, everybody.

Students: Right. We've got a few questions for you, sir. So, we are going to get rolling with that. What is your fondest memory of Blythe Bridge High School?

Mr Leese: So, I would find that a really difficult question to answer. I think. So, I'm probably going to go with the one that makes me laugh the most when I think about it. I'm going to rewind about six years, maybe more. And it was a Year 6 welcome evening for parents, which we do in July every year. I remember that one year, it was so popular with students and parents that the site team hadn't put enough chairs out. I struggled to get through my speech because all the words became blurred, and I just had to miss words out. Every time I think about that, it makes me laugh my head off to think of me, Mrs Johnson, and Mr Jackson running up and down that corridor with chairs and then running off to the stage.

Students: Right. We're going to have a couple of debate questions now. Does pineapple belong on pizza?




Year 8 Art

Women's History Month



All About History

Lessons from Auschwitz

This term, we also participated in the Lessons from Auschwitz project, where two members of our Year 12 history class had the opportunity to visit Auschwitz and attend seminars led by camp survivors. Lucy has written a moving piece describing her experience visiting the camp.



My Auschwitz Experience, by Lucy I, Year 12

Visiting Auschwitz was a sombre and emotional experience that was full of haunting reminders of the atrocities that were committed throughout the Holocaust by the Nazis and their collaborators. Auschwitz, the original concentration camp, stands as a reminder of people's experiences, but also serves as a poignant symbol of resilience and remembrance.

Visitors can witness the bravery of those who endured unimaginable suffering while paying tribute to the millions who lost their lives. Despite the darkness of its history, Auschwitz has transformed into a beacon of education and advocacy against hate, ensuring that the world never forgets the horrors of the past and strives towards a future of peace and understanding.

Auschwitz houses a variety of artefacts that serve as powerful reminders of the suffering that occurred within its walls. Exhibits include personal belongings such as shoes, suitcases, and glasses collected from victims. However, the most shocking and horrifying artefact is the almost two tonnes of hair which was shaved from prisoners' heads upon their arrival to Auschwitz. Another quite frankly shocking artefact is the book of names, which contains the name of every known Holocaust victim. The sheer size of the book serves as a stark reminder of the millions of lives that were brutally extinguished during the Holocaust. These artefacts tell the stories of the millions who were killed at the hands of the Nazis and their collaborators and help to highlight the importance of bearing witness to such atrocities to ensure they are never repeated.

As visitors you are able to witness these haunting artefacts first hand which provides you with a connection to the individuals who suffered and died within the camp.



Punctuality

All students are expected to be in school at 8.45am in good time for Period 1. Any student who arrives after this time is marked late on the register. Two lates per week result in a 30-minute detention after school. It is essential that you ensure your child arrives at school on time to prevent disruption to your child's own learning and that of others. Late after the registers have closed is classified as an unauthorised absence.
