## **Transition**

#### **Year 6 Open Evening**

Our annual New Intake Evening will be taking place on Thursday 18th September for families to tour the school and talk to students and staff. Invites will be distributed in early September with the first presentation starting at 5.30pm, with a second presentation an hour later.



#### **Summer School**

Places remain available for Summer School 2025. This annual events last three days and gives Year 6 students the opportunity to participate in a range of lessons including business, science, art, drama, French, PE, DT and cooking, whilst being able to explore the school without any additional year groups in attendance. Senior Leader for Transition Mr Jackson said, "I would recommend attending summer school to any family. Students who attend have a direct advantage over peers who did not attend. Strong friendship groups are created, and the students already know the school before starting in September. Furthermore, the lessons are fun, and students get to use facilities and resources not available in the Primary curriculum."



#### **Year 4 Legacy Day**

Year 4 students from all six partnership schools participated in their annual legacy day in mid-June. All 191 students actively engaged in sports & activities including athletics, dance, boxercise, fitness, problem solving & trampolining. Year 4 student Otis from Forsbrook said, "I want my dad to buy me a trampoline like we used at the high school. It was ace and we bounced really high." Fellow student Elora from Fulford commented, "The boxercise was ace. I like Miss James the PE teacher, and the dance was fun. Getting all 191 students to do the dance at the end of the day was ace."

#### **Year 5 Science Fun Fest**



Sixty students had the opportunity to attend our annual 'high five science' day in June designed to encourage a fascination in science and beyond. Year 5 student Poppy from Springcroft said, "I really enjoyed the activities, especially the chemistry. We got to explode icing sugar and make electric cars from lemons." Fellow student Jack from Forsbrook commented, "I liked meeting the other students from different schools. The microscopes were ace and let me see what a skin of an onion looks like." Meir Heath student Ralph said, "We learnt how to lift heavy objects using levers. The day was really fun but tiring."



#### **Year 5 Maths Puzzle Day**

Year 5 partnership students attended the annual Maths Puzzle Day on Tuesday 24th June. Participants explored a range of physical puzzles designed to improve rational, logical thinking and problem-solving skills. Student Leo from William Amory said, "I really enjoyed balancing the penguins on the iceberg. I didn't know maths could be this fun." Fellow student Isla from Meir Heath Academy commented, "Building the cubes was really fun but you needed more than two hands. I liked building the 'stair stack' and going as high as it could before it toppled over." #### **Year 5 Roman Day**





On Friday 20th June, a selection of Year 5 students joined us in school to take part in a Roman Extravaganza. Students began the day designing their own Roman Helmet and there were some incredibly bright and elaborate examples created, including a particularly colourful one for Mrs Avons too. Students then set to work learning about life in Roman Britian and how the Roman Army defeated the revolt of Boudicca. The students took their role as Roman Centurions very seriously and quickly began identifying the reasons why the Romans invaded Britain in the first place and judging the reasons why people joined the Roman Army. Once they had acquired this new knowledge, the group were set the challenge of designing their own Roman shields before making their way outside to practice shield formations. To finish the day, students marched into a celebration assembly to perform their 'testudo' formation in front of many of the parents and carers who joined us. 
#### **Year 6 & 7 Diamond Day**





On Tuesday 17th June, in recognition of our 60th year, we hosted our first Diamond Day. Year 8 sports leaders led the day and were joined by a selection of Year 6 students, who will be joining us in September, and a group of Year 7 students who have completed the Inspires Leadership project this year. The day started with some 'get to know you' games and the competition between the teams started quickly. There was lots of trickery on display as students shared two truths and lie about themselves. Lots of fibs went unnoticed as the other teams had to try and guess the lie. The teams then took part in a plethora of relay challenges where they had to run, throw and roll a hoop from one side of the course to the next. #### **Blythe Bridge Graduates Programme**



This term has seen the launch of our very own Blythe Bridge Craduates Programme where a group of ten Year 9 students have taken part in an inspiring and academic project aimed at improving their ability to think critically and develop the quality of their extended written work. Their project centred on evaluating how much Blythe Bridge High School & Sixth Form has changed over the last 60 years since opening in 1964/65.

To begin with, students practised their ability to argue and draw conclusions by deciding which was better, McDonalds or KFC? Students enjoyed developing their questioning and reasoning skills whilst trying to convince their peers about the merits of a Big Mac v Kentucky Fried Chicken.

After this brief introduction to research, decision making and arguing a side, students began to research our school over the years. Here, they looked at a plethora of sources from old timetables, photographs from sporting events & school trips and even an early school handbook. Students identified similarities and differences whilst comparing this information to their own experience of school today. Their research was recorded in a table which they later used when preparing for their final debate and write-up.

A selection of the students involved volunteered to take part in our Diamond Evening where they spoke to former staff and students about their experiences at our school. They shared this information with the rest of the group before all taking sides and arguing if they thought life at school today was mostly similar or different in previous years. Their final task was to produce an extended piece of writing on the topic using the research they had found, and they were expected to evaluate the strength of their arguments. All the students involved approached this final task with confidence and the quality of their work was much improved compared to their initial attempts. Not only did their writing improve, but they also became more inquisitive and confident throughout the programme. What a brilliant group of young people!

Our recent trip to Kenya left a lasting impression on all involved, as staff and students from Blythe Bridge High School & Sixth Form had the privilege of working with the vibrant and welcoming community of St. Trizah's School as part of African Adventures with Port Vale FC Foundation. "From the moment we arrived, we received the warmest of welcomes," said Miss Marsden. "It felt like every single child and adult in that school was just so pleased that we were there." Students and staff alike were moved by the genuine joy and gratitude shown, despite the clear challenges faced by the community.

Miss Marsden reflected on the powerful contrast: "The appreciation for education in Kenya absolutely astounded me. It reminded me how much of a privilege receiving an education is-something we often take for granted in the UK." Students echoed this sentiment. Thalia H shared, "It helps you perceive things differently... not everyone is as lucky as you may think. Be grateful for everything you have." Connor H added, "It was the most heartwarming trip. Some people would love the lives we have."

Mrs Baines recalled a particularly emotional moment: "On the first day, they had streamers for us to cut and were singing and dancing. It was overwhelming and really moved me." The school not only offers education but also a safe place and daily meals to children living in extreme poverty. Joshua G reflected, "We should help each other in any way we can."

Throughout the trip, students took part in reading and maths lessons, creative and sporting activities, and school improvement projects. "One of the highlights was seeing our students reading with children," Miss Marsden said. "Our students brought them so much joy and made them feel seen." Mr Goodwin added, "Watching our students lead activities made me think of how we can use that more back in the UK and see them as role models."

Many students found the school visits the most rewarding part of the experience. Morgan B said, "It was exciting, fulfilling and busy... my favourite part was the volunteering." Freya A shared, "Visiting the school and reading to the children was a highlight. We're very lucky to have the resources and opportunities that others don't." Liam O added, "It was a once-in-alifetime opportunity. It was emotional and a chance to do something to help. I would go again."

Fundraising for the trip was a journey in itself. Students and staff raised money through events such as car boot sales, bake sales, charity matches, quizzes, craft stalls, GoFundMe, and more. "We did bingo nights, football matches, and a chips and quiz night," said Sydney T. "It was worth every penny," added Liam. "We met new people and made new friendships."

Students also had the chance to explore Kenya's natural beauty, including a safari - a favourite for many. Ajay P said, "It was interesting because we saw things we never expected to see. We caught glimpses of lions, zebras, rhinos, and monkeys."

This trip was a powerful reminder of the value of education, the strength of community, and the impact of even the smallest acts of kindness. As Miss Marsden advised to future staff and students on the trip, "Go with the determination to make a difference, the compassion to show kindness and care, and the resilience to face the hardships that you will see others having to endure."












- Contact Mrs Moore (attendance@bb-hs.co.uk) as soon as possible to tell us why your child is absent on every day of absence
  - · Only grant days at home for genuine illness
  - · Contact your form tutor to discuss any concerns
  - JTMAT has a graduated response to attendance and punctuality
- · Attendance letters in line with the JTMAT policy will be sent if attendance is a concern
- We are following the JTMAT policy and a leave of absence in term time could lead to a Fixed Penalty Notice

### Punctuality

All students are expected to be in school at 8.45am in good time for Period 1. Any student who arrives after this time is marked late on the register. Two lates per week result in a 30-minute detention after school. It is essential that you ensure your child arrives at school on time to prevent disruption to your child's own learning and that of others. Late after the registers have closed is classified as an unauthorised absence.


