## Year 10 Chemistry

### YEAR 10 CHEMISTRY

Year 10 chemists are in the midst of the chemical reactions topic. Their attitude and engagement has been fantastic. Students have investigated energy changes during exothermic and endothermic reactions, oxidised and reduced reactants by using oxidising and reducing agents and are currently studying neutralisation reactions. Kian and Harrison expertly and meticulously modelled neutralisation to their class by reacting hydrogen ions, from acids, with hydroxide ions, from alkalis. Universal indicator and a pH meter were used to find pH 7 (pH 7.00 exactly in Harrison's case). Links to prior learning were made when discussing how to obtain the salt from the neutralisation products.

### YEAR 12 GEOGRAPHY BRICK LANE VISIT

On Tuesday 3rd February, Year 12 A level Geography students visited Brick Lane, London for a human geography fieldwork trip linked to the 'Changing Places' topic. The trip provided an excellent case study of how places change over time through shifts in land use, demographics, culture and identity. Students examined Brick Lane's historical role as a centre for brick and tile production, where factories once operated and working-class families lived nearby. This industrial past helped explain how the area developed and set the foundations for later change.

Fieldwork then focused on Brick Lane today as one of London's most diverse and vibrant areas. Students observed the strong multicultural character, with independent shops, cafés and restaurants representing Bangladeshi, Lebanese, Italian, Spanish, Turkish, Hungarian, Polish, Greek and many other ethnicities. The lack of major chain stores highlighted the area's unique identity and importance of independent businesses.

Students collected data on land use, environmental quality, footfall and perceptions of place, applying key geographical concepts such as place meaning and regeneration.

Overall, it was a long but enjoyable and highly productive day, providing valuable data and bringing the Changing Places topic to life outside the classroom.




## Drama Reading

# Free School Meals



See if you are entitled...

It costs nothing to try, so why not give it a go!

You may be eligible for support via benefits related Free School Meals if you meet any of the following low income entitlement criteria:

- Income Support
- Income Based Job Seekers Allowance. Please note the 'new style' job seekers allowance is not a qualifying benefit.
- Income Related Employment and Support Allowance. Please note the 'new style' employment and support allowance is not a qualifying benefit.
- Eligible for Child Tax Credit but not Working Tax Credit and the household income (as used by HMRC to assess tax credits) is not more than £16,190.
- The Guarantee element of State Pension Credit
- Support under part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- In receipt of the 4 week run on of working tax credit
- Universal credit (provided you have an annual net earned household income of no more than £7,400 as assessed by earnings from up to three of your most recent assessment periods). Your net earned income is your household income after taxes and deductions and does not include income from Universal Credit or any other benefits you may receive.

Even if your child prefers packed lunch, it is worth registering to receive benefits such as:

- A discounted place on some school trips
- Year 6 Headstart pack on transition including one school tie and headphones
- 20% voucher for National Schoolwear, Hanley
- Access to free food and activities during the school holidays

Help the school by registering for Free School Meals!

By registering for Free School Meals, you will also allow school to receive PUPIL PREMIUM, which is extra money from the government to support children from families on lower incomes. The funding that school receives can be used for a range of interventions including help with costs of school trips, music fees, teaching assistant staff, after school programmes and equipment.
